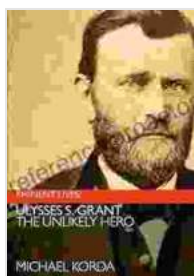


Ulysses S. Grant: The Unlikely Hero

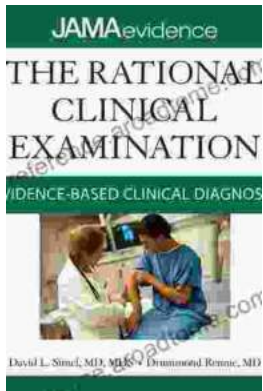

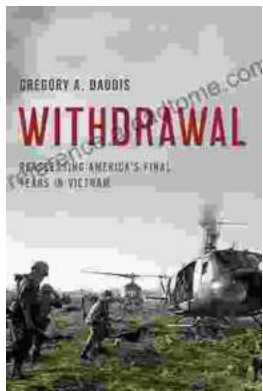
