

Unveiling the Hidden Battle: How the Feud Between the FBI and CIA Led to 11

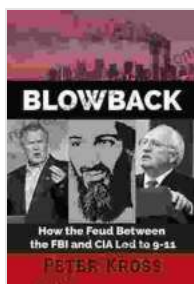

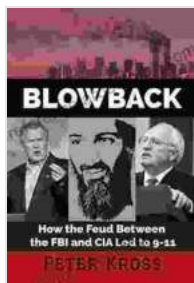
Since then, significant steps have been taken to bridge the divide between the FBI and CIA. The National Counterterrorism Center was established to

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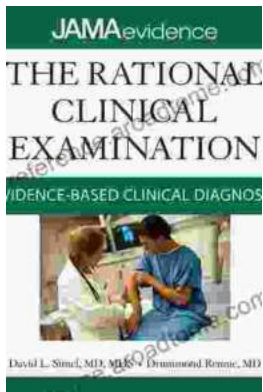
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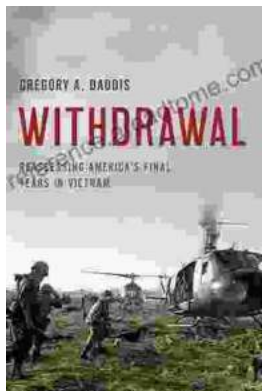
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
